




Happy Memories of the school show 1968







THEN GIVE THREE CHEERS for the school's "H.M.S. Pinafore"

When the main lights went down, when the curtains parted and struggled gamely to right and left, there she was: the good ship "Pinafore", or at least her poop deck, most convincingly filling the west end of the school hall.

Purists might object that the main mast is not usually set up behind the poop — which after all is the after end of the ship. But anybody interested in stagecraft, prepared to accept symbolism rather than a slavish realism, could see that this set was a triumph of improvisation, brilliantly turning to advantage the very defects of the platform stage.

The tiered seats (normally the province of V. and VI.) had been railed off with nautical-looking plywood and provided a useful series of (normally the different levels.

From the first chorus by the crew (briefly swabbing the decks) it was clear that one of the merits of this production was to be crisp and expressive singing by fresh young voices. This promise was borne out throughout the two acts by the full chorus of sailors and sisters and cousins and aunts.

What of the principals? Hilton McRae had a voice to match the acid wit of Sir Joseph Porter, K.C.B. (King of Comic Business?) and revealed a flair for timing, as well as a willingness to suffer in the cause of slapstick. No





matter how often he hit the deck, he came up imperturbably and precisely polite, as he was even when

Marlyn Doig, a determined, uncrushable Hebe, worshipped him consistently with big-eyed adoration.

Frances Heron played Josephine with a clarity of diction that made the most of her lines — humorous or pathetic, or both. Her singing voice had purity of tone, and hit the high notes with carefree certainty. Ralph Rackstraw, the able seaman who found that all men are equal --- except Sir Joseph — had in Rodger Brunton an interpreter who sang well and managed to inject a kind of jaunty soulfulness into the "hero's" rather colourless personality.

Graeme Kiddie, with the command-ing presence for Captain Corcoran, accepted his ultimate demotion with great good humour; and his secure and resonant baritone was a pleasure to listen to. Little Buttercup, the Ports mouth bumboat woman, was not the usual hearty-contralto type. Boyd substituted a wistful which would surely endear every sailor in port.

The villain of the piece, Dick Deadeye, was undoubtedly triangular, yet in Charles Denovan's interpretation not too villainous. Scarred and deformed, yes; but not so much twisted as merely trying to help.

Peter Gordon as the boatswain, Bill Bobstay, looking like somebody out of "Moby Dick", was a thoroughly digni-fied pillar of the lower deck and sang his patriotic ditty in fine style. The carpenter, Bob Becket, was played by carpenter, bob becket, was piayed by Richard Bueckardt (deep voice and high stature) with gawky, self-possessed enthusiasm, seen at its best in the closing dance. The two Marines, Christopher Thomson and Gordon Wallace, brought a touch of N.W.M.P. scarlet to the scene.

But the lowlight of the show was assuredly Grant Mackie's Tom Tucker, the Very Small Midshipman. A tiny part, no doubt, but one which was featured to provide numerous cheeky-urchin touches of fun.

The production was steered to success by Mr Bennet, musical director (with the accompanist, Mrs Grant), and the joint producers and stage
